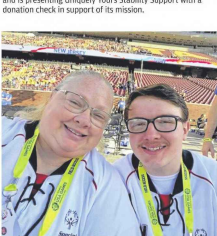
Dugout Bar in downtown Fremont is under new ownership and is presenting Uniquely Yours Stability Support with a donation check in support of its mission.

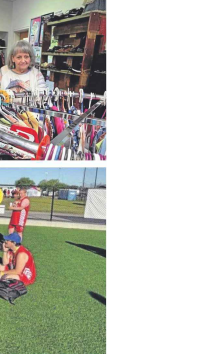
